REGIONAL HUMAN RIGHTS NEWS

In the **Americas**, the Inter-American Commission on Human Rights released a report detailing the history and impact of its <u>friendly settlement procedure</u>, and held <u>hearings</u> on a wide range of human rights concerns throughout the hemisphere. The Inter-American Court of Human Rights

DEVELOPMENTS AT THE UNITED NATIONS

Over the past two months, the United Nations human rights bodies have been engaged in various activities, including developing new standards and reviewing current State practices.

Fourteen countries' human rights practices were scrutinized during the most recent <u>Universal Periodic Review</u> session.

The UN Working Group on the use of mercenaries is urging the international community to enact <u>enhanced regulation</u> of <u>private security companies</u>, following the conviction of Blackwater security guards for the Nisour Square killings.

In <u>three new general comments</u>, UN human rights treaty bodies clarified

held Guatemala responsible for its failure to adequately investigate the killing of a human rights defender, found that the <u>Dominican Republic</u>'s mass expulsion of people of Haitian descent violated multiple human rights, and advanced in its processing of several cases during its <u>105th Session</u>. Through a new advisory opinion and a country visit, the Inter-American human rights bodies clarified the rights of <u>migrant children</u>.

In **Europe**, the European Court of Human Rights issued judgments concerning extraterritorial application of the European Convention on Human Rights to the actions of <u>British soldiers</u> in Iraq, <u>Ukraine</u>'s detention of a political protester, the privacy rights of medical patients in <u>Russia</u>, the right to language interpretation during criminal proceedings in <u>Turkey</u>, and the use of military polling stations during elections in <u>Azerbaijan</u>.

States' obligations with regard to detention, harmful practices affecting women and girls, and the rights of refugee and stateless women.

A new <u>International Day to End</u> <u>Impunity for Crimes against Journalists</u> recognizes the growing trend of violence against journalists.

The UN High Commissioner for Human Rights and Working Group on Arbitrary Detention have urged Venezuela to release political prisoners, including Leopoldo Lopez.

<u>UN Climate Summit 2014</u> yielded some political commitments to address climate change and prompted action by hundreds of thousands of advocates and supporters.

The <u>Committee on the Rights of the Child</u> examined the impact of digital media on childhood and reviewed six States' implementation of their obligations concerning children's human rights.

The UN Human Rights Council has requested an investigation into human rights abuses committed by the <u>Islamic State</u> and associated groups in Iraq.

The <u>First World Conference on Indigenous Peoples</u> brought indigenous peoples, civil society, and UN Member States together to discuss perspectives and best practices on the realization of indigenous peoples' rights.



INTERNATIONAL CRIMINAL LAW UPDATES

The **International Criminal Court** opened a second investigation into violence in the <u>Central African Republic</u>.

In South Africa and Argentina, national authorities have initiated proceedings with a view to prosecuting those responsible for human rights abuses in Spain and Zimbabwe, through the exercise of universal jurisdiction.
